Program Commitment – Winter 2008 & Beyond

- Work on predetermined research, evaluation, or surveillance projects.

Types of active OSH projects, Fellow's MPH

Expected Deliverables at End of Fellowship

- Oral presentation to CDC scientists & staff.
- Serve as a point-of-contact and source of information for future ORISE Fellows.
- Optional: Publication with CDC scientist.
- \$3,200 per month during the 3-month rotation.

Application Process and Program Requirements

- Applicant must have received a college degree or must expect to complete all requirements for such a degree prior to the desired starting date.
- U.S. citizenship or permanent resident alien status is preferred for all appointments but is not required.
- Medical/health insurance is a requirement of the program and is available through ORISE if the participant chooses.

Applicant should include:

- Cover letter expressing interest.
- Detailed curriculum vitae (CV).
- Writing sample.
